during English. Sofia overcame her nervousness to perform her group gymnastics routine in PE.




Year 6: Wonderful effort from Cory this week. He achieved some good maths work; staying focussed and

Wellbeing

When another person, including your child, presents with anger it can sometimes be hard to remember to have empathy, especially if they have upset or hurt you.

Outward anger often has many other feelings underlying it, shown in this picture of the "anger iceberg". These feelings underneath can help provide insight for you and your child as to why they're experiencing this anger, and in turn, start to work through it.

Try using sentences starting with "I wonder if...", "I notice that..." or "I imagine this..." to help your conversations get started.

You can ensure you have understood by "Let me check I've got that right..." or "Help me understand..." Children will be familiar with this technique, called Emotion Coaching, from school.





Book recommendation: The Invisible String by Patrice Karst

It is the story of the String (made out of love!) that connects us all. The Invisible String offers children a tangible understanding of love and teaches the world about the String that "even though you can't see it with your eyes, you can feel it in your heart and know that you are always connected to everyone you love".

This is really useful for any child struggling with loss or separation.

On Monday 4th March, Reception Class had Rowan's dad Alex visited us. He is part of the search and rescue team! He showed us all of the equipment he uses. He showed us how he uses rope to rescue people and even how to give CPR! We loved the visit and learnt so much about the job role. Thank you Rowan's dad, you are awesome!

My favourite activity was when we were doing the life-saving and one strong swimmer had to 'save' their team mates. If you got to the end before anyone else, you got one point.


We all had lots of fun – it was a brilliant afternoon!
